Improving Cost of Global Supply Chains

With increasing globalization over the past several years, many companies have allocated significant resources to the implementation of global supply chain management processes. In order to remain competitive, they now need to assess how productively these processes are being operated. The aim of this talk is to share some experiences at Lilly in which we have pursued productivity improvements in these global business processes, including what we're learning about:

- What do productivity improvements in supply chain processes really look like?
- Who are the customers of the processes and what do they need?
- How do we measure these processes?
- How do we measure the success of our improvement efforts?
- What should our approach be to ensuring continuous evaluation and improvement of our supply chain processes?

Aiming Higher

I had a dream the other night that a team of people from our Chapter, Ivy Tech, the Indiana Economic Development Corporation (IEDC), and the Indiana Statehouse were standing on the top of a mountain looking out over the future as if it were the past. We were remarking upon how many and varied the successes were that had arisen out of our partnership to provide APICS certification training throughout the state of Indiana.

We could see a displaced machinist, let's call him Carl Jones. Maybe Carl had a college degree or maybe he didn't. What Carl did have was a family and a need to better provide for them. Carl heard about the CPIM classes through Ivy Tech and seized the opportunity.

Carl's new salary was \$42,000, but the best part of the story was that his family now had health care benefits. Seizing that opportunity changed the trajectory of Carl's own life and the lives of his family members.

Within 12 months, Carl earned the certification and was recruited to work for a Fortune 500 company as a planner. We could see a company we'll call ACME, perhaps one of the many medical device companies in Warsaw,

Indiana. ACME had struggled with the high costs of their in-process inventories. ACME's management heard about custom CPIM classes through Ivy Tech and sent their material management team through the classes. ACME then implemented Just-In-Time, an industry best practices, reducing its in-process inventories by 30%. With the additional floor space and capital freed-up from inventories, ACME was able to buy some new equipment, expand its product line, and hire more people in the process.

We could see the Partridge Company, a small family business in Paoli, Indiana. Mr. Partridge, the business founder and owner, learned about the new CSCP through Ivy Tech. Mr. Partridge sent his son Junior, the company's sales manager, to the nearby campus to learn about customer relations management. Junior did some analysis using his new tools and discovered that 30% of Partridge's current business was actually losing the company money. With the money saved by re-negotiating those contracts, Partridge was able to expand the business and give Junior a well-earned bonus.

Best of all, we could see a network of professional connections and life-long friendships that developed as businesses of all sizes came together to become more efficient and more competitive. Our Chapter, Ivy Tech, the IEDC, and the Indiana Statehouse are working hard to make these visions a reality. We choose to do these things; to replace inventories with information, to optimize decision-making across all the links of our supply chains, to stretch our minds with new ideas, to stretch our enterprises with new processes, to stretch our workforce with new tools; not because they are easy, but because they are hard. John F. Kennedy was fond of saying that a rising tide lifts all boats. Get ready, Indiana, because the tide is coming in!

The APICS Central Indiana Chapter has long been recognized by Society as one of the best run chapters in the country. A lot of work has gone on in the past to create efficient processes that have endured the test of time. An equal amount of work goes on today to keep the chapter vibrant and to offer further benefits to our members, to our profession, and to the state of Indiana.

One of the most important processes we follow involves how we select and elect the next set of leaders for our chapter. Each year, the chapter elects an Executive Vice President among a slate of about 15 Directors as governed by our bylaws. Our Chapter is in the process of revising our bylaws to move the election timing forward a month from May to April to better facilitate strategic planning.

Our chapter is very fortunate to have Jason Wheeler as our current Executive Vice President. Jason is part of the Rotational Development Program at Roche Diagnostics and currently works as the Supervisor of Physical Logistics. Jason holds his Certification in Production & Inventory Management and is also a Certified Supply Chain Professional. Last year, Jason was selected as Co-Board Member of the Year for our chapter. During April, the Board of Directors of APICS, the Association for Operations Management, met and discussed changing the benefits of corporate membership. In the past, companies could pay for 5 memberships and get member discounts for all other employees as corporate associates. The downside of the old corporate membership program was that corporate associates did not receive any of the APICS communications from the Association, the Region, or the Chapter. During their meeting, the Board of Directors discussed extending an unlimited number of free one-year professional memberships for corporate members to use in place of the past corporate associate status. With this proposal, APICS would better communicate at all levels with the employees of corporate members. A committee led by Eric Schaudt, the Vice President of Chapter Development, was tasked with further studying this and other proposals and bringing a more detailed proposal

to the next meeting of the Board during the summer.

One of the benefits APICS-CIND offers is free posting of career opportunities on our web site (www.apics-cind.org and click on job bank). Our job bank has seen increased activity over the past twelve months, with companies of all sizes and corporate recruiters placing positions.
